WHEREAS, Betty Tinker was a passionate and devoted fan of the Tennessee Volunteers, and her favorite color was orange. Vol fans across the nation knew they could always count on "Ms. Betty"; and

WHEREAS, born on April 22, 1934, Betty Tinker was the daughter of Edwin "Mac" McCain and Agnes Hunter McCain and a lifelong resident of the Maryville/Alcoa area; and

WHEREAS, Betty Tinker was a founding and active member of Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Church, which she served faithfully for many years; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we express our sympathy and offer our condolences to the family of Elizabeth M. "Betty" Tinker.


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an appropriate copy of this resolution be prepared for presentation with this final clause omitted from such copy.
